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enough support to the new paper. LOUISE, according to the informant, promised [redacted] that donations to the paper and a drive for subscribers would be made among various IWO groups. (X)(U)

On March 22, 1946, Confidential Informant [redacted] learned that ALFRED WAGENKNECHT, first vice chairman, District 8, Communist Party, requested the subject to aid in the defense of [redacted] who is coming to trial on the deportation proceedings of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service. [redacted] at one time was reported very active among Communists and leader of the Famous Republic Steel strike on Memorial Day, 1937, when several persons were killed. According to the informant, a committee which will be known as the Weber Defense Committee has been organized and WAGENKNECHT has requested that subject assist the committee in protesting the deportation proceedings through her various International Workers Order contacts. (X)(U)

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On March 28, 1946, Confidential Informant [redacted] learned that [redacted] had requested the subject to assist him in a convention of the United Negro and Allied Veterans of America, a reported Communist dominated organization, the convention to be held in Chicago April 6 and 7, 1946, at the DuSable High School. According to informant, the South Side Section Council of the Communist Party was attempting to secure housing for delegates to the convention and were also printing a souvenir program from which they hoped to realize considerable finances. LOUISE, according to the informant, put out a number of calls to IWO members to house the visiting delegates but received no replies. (X)(U)

On April 9, 1946, [redacted] of the newly organized United Negro and Allied Veterans of America, requested subject's assistance in finding office space for his organization, the headquarters of which was to be located in Chicago. Informant also learned that LOUISE THOMPSON PATTERSON recommended [redacted] as a [redacted] to work in the office of the United Negro and Allied Veterans of America for [redacted] (X)(U)

ACTIVITIES WITH DU SABLE LODGE NO. 751, IWO

The January, 1946, issue of the "Fraternal Outlook," official IWO publication, on page 12 published an article captioned "DuSable IWO Honors Atom Bomb Scientist." The article went on to state that a dinner was held at 3831 South Michigan on October 26, 1945, at which JASPER B. JEFFRIES, a member of the DuSable Lodge, who worked as a physicist on the atom bomb at the University of Chicago, was present. JEFFRIES was the guest of honor at this dinner. A group photograph appears on the same page as the article and this photograph shows the subject seated at the banquet table with several other well known reported Communists including subject's husband, WILLIAM L. PATTERSON, vice chairman, District 8, Communist Party.

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This article is being retained for future evidentiary purposes.

On March 7, 1946, Confidential Informant [redacted] learned that subject had received \$75 from the Jewish Peoples Fraternal Order of the International Workers Order to finance her trip to New York City. According to informant, subject remained in New York City on IWO official business until March 21. (S)(u)

On April 26, 1946, Confidential Informant [redacted] membership drive meeting of DuSable Lodge No. 751, 5120 South Park Avenue. According to the informant, subject stated that the lodge was now in its final lap for 1,000 new members and on April 26 they were only 300 short of that goal. It was announced that leaflets advertising the DuSable Lodge were passed out at the conclusion of an American Youth for Democracy banquet celebrating [redacted] official of American Youth for Democracy, who had just returned from a trip to Europe and the Soviet Union. (S)(u)

On May 7, 1946, Confidential Informant [redacted] DuSable IWO banquet held at the Y.W.C.A. at 3765 South Wabash, the purpose of the banquet being to welcome PAUL ROBESON as a No. 1 member of DuSable No. 751 Lodge. A photograph appeared in the "Chicago Defender," Negro weekly newspaper, showing the subject pinning the IWO button of PAUL ROBESON's lapel. Also, according to an article in the "Chicago Defender," a number of well known reported Communists attended this banquet.

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COMMUNIST ACTIVITIES AMONG CHICAGO NEGROES

On October 19, 1945, Confidential Informant [redacted] learned that [redacted] of the Abraham Lincoln School, reported Communist front organization, planned a class to start November 5, 1945. The name of the class, according to the informant, was "The Negro and the World Today." The class was to be of seven weeks duration. (S)(u)

On October 22, 1945, Confidential Informant [redacted] learned that [redacted] also was requested by the subject to start a class for approximately twenty-five members of the International Workers Order.

On April 10, 1946, Confidential Informant [redacted] reported that the subject was active in preparing and sponsoring a ten week lecture course on "Negroes Fight for Freedom." This class, according to the informant, was to commence on April 10, 1946. The course was prepared with the cooperation of Abraham Lincoln School and included many well known reported Communists and fellow travelers. (S)(u)

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CRIMINAL RECORD

On February 14, 1946, Special Employee [redacted] checked the records of the Chicago Police Department, Bureau of Information and Statistics. He was unable to find a criminal record for the subject.

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On February 18, 1946, the Identification Division of the Bureau advised that it was not possible to locate a record of the subject from the description sent by this office.

continues in her post as national Vice President of the IWO. Confidential Informant [redacted] advises that subject continues to occupy the post of Executive Secretary of the DuSable Lodge No. 751. The DuSable Lodge has the largest membership of any IWO Lodge in the United States. Its membership is composed mainly of the Negro race. *LU*

Subject's Activities in Financial Drive to Purchase USO Center

July 12, 1946

Confidential Informant [redacted] learned that the subject, GIL GREEN, Chairman of the CP District 8, [redacted] of the South Side Section of the CP and WILLIAM L. PATTERSON, husband of the subject, were all very much interested in the purchase of the USO Center known as Servicemen's Center No. 3 for Colored Servicemen located at 49th & Wabash in Chicago. According to informant, all the above persons were agreed that the USO Center should be purchased by the DuSable Lodge IWO and that organization would later sell it to the CP District 8. They all felt that if it were known that the CP was purchasing the building, pressure would be exerted on the property owner not to sell to the Communist Party. Informant learned from GIL GREEN that there were sufficient hostile forces that would be alarmed by the progressive movements moving into the South Side Section of Chicago and these forces would prevent the CP from getting the building. GREEN also felt that the CP could not solicit a large amount of money in its own name without conducting an extensive financial campaign which would then become known to hostile reactionary forces. *LU*

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July 18, 1946

Confidential Informant [redacted] advised this office that the subject was quietly trying to raise \$10,000.00 toward the purchase of the USO Center at 49th & Wabash. Informant advised that the total purchase price of the building as set by [redacted] was \$55,000.00. According to Informant, LOUISE PATTERSON stated that there were many forces in the city that will try to prevent the sale of the building to the DuSable Lodge and other progressive forces. She stated that if \$10,000.00 were raised by August 1, 1946, they will sign the contract to purchase the building. Informant further advised that a meeting was held of the DuSable Lodge on August 16, at which pledges amounted to \$2300.00. The Lodge is accepting \$100.00 loans at 5% interest to be paid in six months. PAUL ROBESON, according to Informant, will also assist in the financial campaign after \$10,000.00 has been paid on the contract to purchase. He will assist in the financial campaign by arranging for a group of star stage personalities to appear on benefit programs sponsored by the DuSable Lodge. *LU*

July 30, 1946

Confidential Informant [redacted] learned from [redacted] that he and LOUISE PATTERSON would borrow \$3,000.00 on the initial drive for \$10,000.00. (u)

August 5, 1946

Informant [redacted] was advised by LOUISE PATTERSON that she had paid \$10,000.00 on August 3, and that she has until January 2, 1947, to get \$17,500.00 additional which will make a total of \$27,500.00 down payment. Mrs. PATTERSON advised informant that when this amount is paid the mortgage will be signed and the building may then be occupied. (u)

August 7, 1946

Confidential Informant [redacted] learned from LOUISE PATTERSON that it was definitely decided that the drive to collect funds for the purchase of the USO Center should be strictly under the DuSable Lodge sponsorship and that a special committee of people should operate the Center. LOUISE also felt that she would want a very "broad" committee drawn up to raise funds so no one person would be afraid about going after money. At the same time informant learned that GIL GREEN would call a meeting of the secretariat of the CP District 8 and that at the meeting it would be decided who will constitute the personnel to operate the USO Center after its purchase. GREEN also felt that one person should be in charge of the Center. (u)

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September 20, 1946

Confidential Informant [redacted] learned that a meeting with [redacted] of United Packing House Workers of America - CIO; ALFRED WAGNER NECHT, Vice Chairman CP District 8; and WILLIAM L. PATTERSON, husband of the subject and LOUISE THOMPSON PATTERSON were all interested and taking an active part in the purchase of the USO Center. WILLIAM L. PATTERSON told informant that the purchase of the building is not strictly a Communist deal but the building would belong to the people of the South Side Section of Chicago and this is the first project of its type to be tried on the South Side of Chicago and that the following people have given assistance in the drive for funds: (u)

According to informant, PATTERSON stated that they wish to raise \$100,000.00 by March 1, 1947. They also expect to set up a membership and charge \$5.00, \$10.00, and \$25.00 for membership. PATTERSON stated that this arrangement (u)

would not alter the fact that the Center would be a non-profit organization and tax exempt. Many alterations will be necessary and the entire cost for the first year would be about \$81,000.00. *XU*

September 25, 1946

Confidential Informant [] furnished this office a letter signed by [] of the CP and LOUISE PATTERSON. The letter was dated September 19, 1946, extending an invitation to attend a luncheon in honor of [] of the CP, on Wednesday noon, September 25, at Riccardo's Studio Restaurant, 437 North Rush Street. The letter went on to state that [] had recently been named to the position of [] and many in local labor circles have expressed a desire to meet him. The letter went on to state that an opportunity was being afforded to hear about a new and important project being undertaken in Chicago by sections of organized labor and important groups in the Negro community. This letter is being retained in the subject's file. *XU*

Confidential Informant [] further learned that the purpose of the luncheon meeting was an endorsement by [] of the purchase of the USO Center at 49th & Wabash and that this Center was to be known as the "DuSable Community Center, Inc." At the luncheon [] stated that the building would serve as a Center for Trade Unions and help to build Negro and White unity. LOUISE PATTERSON spoke at the meeting, according to informant, and described the Center in detail and after her talk the United Electrical, Radio & Machine Workers of America - CIO, pledged \$500.00. [] of the United Packing House Workers of America - CIO, pledged \$1,000.00. [] of the Farm Equipment and Metal Workers of America - CIO, pledged \$1,000.00. The United Automobile Workers of America - CIO, Local 453, also pledged a large unknown amount. *XU*

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At this meeting a committee of [] for UERMA - CIO; [] United Farm Equipment and Metal Workers - CIO, all well known CP members and Trade Unionists, will work with LOUISE PATTERSON in her financial drive to raise funds. *XU*

Subject's Activities in Front Groups

May 15, 1946

~~CONF. INFO~~ [] learned from [] of the South Side Section of the CP, that LOUISE PATTERSON was to be in charge of delegates to the National Convention of the National Negro Congress to be held in Detroit. One delegate is to represent the IWO and other national groups of the CP front organizations. [] told informant that he had hoped to have fifteen delegates to the convention. However, LOUISE PATTERSON was of the opinion that he would consider seven delegates a sufficient number because of the expense of sending a delegate, which would amount to approximately \$30.00 per person. *XU*

Informant also learned from [redacted] that one delegate will represent the DuSable No. 751 IWO Lodge and that LOUISE PATTERSON will go as a delegate if the CP District 8 will pay her expenses. (u)

June 25, 1946

~~CONF. INFT.~~ [redacted] was advised by [redacted] that LOUISE PATTERSON will serve on the Continuation Committee of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee and is working very hard to get the Committee started. (u)

August 10, 1946

An article appeared in the "Chicago Star," a Communist-dominated and controlled weekly newspaper, and on page sixteen the following captioned article was carried: "Delegation to Demand Action on Lynchings." The article stated that two hundred Chicagoans were en route to demand action on the Georgia lynchings, and that the delegates were being sent by a newly formed "Chicago Citizens Committee Against Lynching." It stated that a meeting was held at 35th & South Parkway and 5,000 persons were present at the meeting. The article stated that LOUISE THOMPSON PATTERSON spoke at the meeting and listed the names of several other well-known Communists.

August 30, 1946

~~CONF. INFT.~~ Confidential Informant [redacted] the National Convention of the National Negro Congress held in Detroit from May 30 through June 2. Informant advised that there were sixty-eight delegates from Illinois. Among the delegates informant identified the subject and her husband, WILLIAM L. PATTERSON. It was also learned from informant that the subject and her husband were elected to the Executive Board at the National Negro Congress Convention.

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Subject's General CP Activities

Confidential Informant [redacted] learned from [redacted] of the National Association of the Advancement of Colored People, 3456 South State Street, that he had been invited by LOUISE PATTERSON to speak at an OPA rally sponsored by CP District 8 at the Chicago City Hall. [redacted] told informant that he had accepted the invitation to speak. (u)

June 19, 1946

A highly confidential source of the Los Angeles Field Division advised that the name of LOUISE THOMPSON, 316 North Michigan, Secretary of the IWO, was included among a list of persons who have been active in Russian War Relief and the Chicago Council of American-Soviet Friendship in the possession of [redacted] an alleged NKVD Agent of Russia. (u)

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July 2, 1946

Confidential Informant [redacted] furnished a copy of a letter dated May 15, 1945. The letter was addressed to [redacted] Chicago, Illinois. The letter acknowledged the receipt of a \$100.00 loan sent to the DuSable No. 751 IWO Lodge. The letter further explained that the Lodge had been negotiating for the purchase of property at 3411 South Michigan which would be used as a Center for the IWO. However, the check for \$100.00 was being returned because negotiations for the purchase of the building did not go through. It stated that the national office of the IWO had unanimously voted against the purchase of the building as they did not feel it was wise to purchase this particular property. The letter was signed by LOUISE THOMPSON PATTERSON. Informant also furnished copies of some of the letters in which checks were returned to the following individuals by the subject: (u)

Chicago Woman Raises \$33,000 for Community

Here's the story of a woman who saw the need of a community center on the south side of Chicago, and who went about getting the necessary money. Almost single-handed, she directed the raising of \$33,000. Mrs. Louise Patterson is the national vice-president of the International Workers Order, and president of the Chicago Division. But aside from her work in her field, she has carried out the "Du Sable Community Center Inc." idea as extra enterprise.

Aiming toward buying the building located at 62 E 49 st (49 and Wabash) which was formerly known as Bacon's Casino, and later as the Serviceman's Center for the South Side, Mrs. Patterson was aided by trade unions, church groups, social clubs, interested citizens, and artists like Paul Robeson, Kenneth Spencer, Langston Hughes, Erskine Hawkins, and Billy Eckstine.

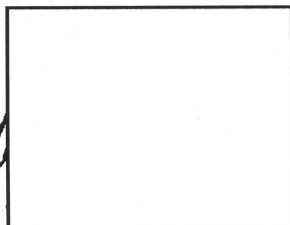
The funds raised amounted to \$33,000 and made possible the purchasing of the building, which, incidentally has an outdoor pavilion where Joe Louis fought his first three professional fights. When the remodeling is completed, emphasis will be placed upon the needs of both adults and children of the community.

Mrs. Patterson is the wife of William L. Patterson, and the mother of four-year-old Mary Lewis. On her brief trip to New York recently she was the guest of Mrs. Dorothy Spencer.

Occupation

According to an article which appeared in the "Daily Worker", an east coast daily publication in New York City, on page five, column three dated April 1, 1949, it was revealed that LOUISE THOMPSON PATTERSON had joined the staff of the Council on African Affairs. The article advised that she was to take over the duties as director of that organization.

The Council on African Affairs has been cited by the Attorney General as a Communist organization.

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Past Employment

Chicago [] of known reliability, stated that on December 5, 1946 LOUISE PATTERSON was president of the Midwest Council of the International Workers Order in Chicago and National Vice-President of the International Workers Order. The informant also advised that she was executive secretary of the DuSable Lodge 751 of the International Workers Order. The DuSable Lodge, according to the informant, has the largest membership of any IWO lodge in the United States at the present time.

The International Workers Order has been cited by the Attorney General as a Communist organization.

Chicago [] of known reliability, stated that on December 1, 1947 LOUISE THOMPSON PATTERSON attended an Illinois State Communist Party Convention on November 26, 1947 and was not re-elected to the State Communist Party Committee for Illinois.

Chicago [] of known reliability, stated that on December 7, 1948 it was announced that LOUISE PATTERSON had been elected executive vice-president of the DuSable Center of the International Workers Order in Chicago, Lodge 751.

II. ACTIVITIES AND AFFILIATIONS

Communist Party

Chicago [] of known reliability, [] stated that LOUISE PATTERSON attended a membership meeting of the Southside Communist Party which was held on April 20, 1947 at the DuSable Community Center located at 62 East 49th Street, Chicago, Illinois.

Chicago File 100-4092

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Chicago [] advised that on September 10, 1947 LOUISE PATTERSON stated that she had been requested to permit the Communist Party to hold a midwest conference in the DuSable Center on September 27 and 28, 1947. LOUISE PATTERSON stated that she strenuously opposed the use of the center on the grounds that since the center was just getting into operation it might have been dangerous to have had the Communist Party hold a large meeting in the center at that time.

Chicago [] stated that on September 26, 1947 LOUISE PATTERSON stated that she had attended a meeting of the Negro Commission of the Communist Party at the Greek Hall, 5522 South Halsted Street, Chicago.

The informant advised that during the meeting PATTERSON had given a report on a two day National Negro Commission meeting which had been held at New York earlier that month. It was reported that during this meeting the National Negro Commission had served its useful purpose and that it must be liquidated locally and nationally. According to the informant PATTERSON was in favor of the liquidation proceeding for the National Negro Commission.

Chicago [] advised that on November 21, 1947 LOUISE THOMPSON PATTERSON of the DuSable Lodge of the International Workers Order in Chicago said that it would be difficult for the DuSable Center to operate on its own during January of 1948 and that it would take the center at least six months to get back on its feet. She stated that she had attempted to secure a direct subsidy from the Communist Party for about a six month period. PATTERSON revealed that GIL GREEN, Chairman of the Communist Party, District No. 8, had stated that the Communist Party would have to work out more carefully the matter of finances for the center during the six month period in question.

Chicago [] stated that on November 22, 1947 LOUISE PATTERSON attended a Communist Party meeting held at the Orchestra Hall in Chicago on November 21, 1947.

It was also reported by Chicago [] that on January 5, 1948 LOUISE PATTERSON had attended an Illinois Communist Party Convention on November 28, 1947 in the West Room of the Ashland Auditorium, Ashland and Van Buren Streets, Chicago, Illinois.

Chicago [] revealed that on May 8, 1948 LOUISE PATTERSON stated that she had attended a meeting of the Communist Party which was held at the DuSable

Center in Chicago on Sunday, May 8, 1948. She stated that the purpose of the meeting was to discuss the Progressive Party and the action to be taken by it during the coming election. She also advised that during this meeting she had been assigned to work with the Progressive Party in the Chicago area.

Chicago [] advised that on March 4, 1948 LOUISE PATTERSON attended an emergency city-wide Communist Party membership meeting at the DuSable Community Center, 49th and Wabash Avenue. PATTERSON did not disclose the purpose of the meeting according to the informant.

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International Workers Order

Chicago [] of known reliability, stated that on April 30, 1947 PATTERSON stated that she had been the chairman of a meeting of the Midwest Section of the International Workers Order, 64 West Randolph Street, Chicago, Illinois. During this meeting she stated that the International Workers Order was going through a complete change. She said that the International Workers Order lodges throughout the country would be broken up into nationality groups. The negro people would be in negro lodges - the Jewish people would be in Jewish lodges, etc.

LOUISE PATTERSON further advised that only the Soviet Union worked in harmony with its people because it had no nationality group problem. She stated that the Soviet Union enjoyed their own cultural life and they had a unity among all their people which no other country or any amount of countries could break. She said that European problems were our problems and that people in the United States would never be American until European problems were settled.

Chicago [] of known reliability, revealed that on May 21, 1947 LOUISE PATTERSON indicated that she was not too interested in taking over an Abraham Lincoln School Annex in Chicago. She indicated that she would rather see a DuSable lodge of the IWO promote an educational program which would be financed by the Abraham Lincoln School. She advised that she would like to emphasize child care, child psychology, art, literature, grammar, history and social problems in the educational program of DuSable Lodge 751 of the IWO.

The Abraham Lincoln School has been cited by the Attorney General as a Communist organization.

Chicago [] stated that on August 5, 1947 the DuSable Lodge of the IWO in Chicago held a meeting which had been called by LOUISE PATTERSON. The

informant advised that LOUISE PATTERSON indicated that the meeting had been held for the purpose of working out a program to encourage the labor unions in Chicago to use the DuSable Center for its meetings. PATTERSON advised that it had been announced at the meeting that \$27,000 had been raised to help pay off the mortgage on the DuSable Center.

Chicago [redacted] known reliability, advised that on November 3, 1947 LOUISE THOMPSON PATTERSON stated that she had tried to find about ten International Workers Order members to attend a DuSable Community Center founders dinner which she had scheduled for October 6, 1947 at the center. It was indicated by the informant that she was having difficulty obtaining members to attend the dinner.

Chicago [redacted] of known reliability, stated that on January 28, 1949 LOUISE PATTERSON stated that a farewell testimonial dinner had been given in her honor. The dinner was held at the DuSable Community Center Ballroom, 5958 South Wabash.

The informant advised that LOUISE PATTERSON was the wife of WILLIAM L. PATTERSON who only recently was Vice-Chairman of the Communist Party, District No. 8, and was recently appointed chairman of the Civil Rights Congress with headquarters in New York City. The informant stated that LOUISE PATTERSON had advised the members during the farewell testimonial dinner that she would join her husband in New York City about the first of January, 1949 and that she would be giving up her DuSable activities in Chicago.

The Civil Rights Congress is cited by the Attorney General as a Communist organization.

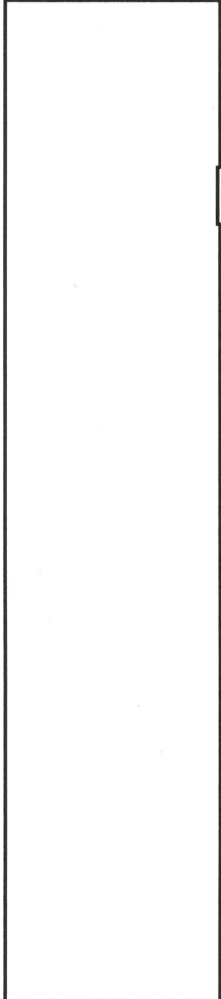
Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee

Chicago [redacted] advised that on September 9, 1947 LOUISE PATTERSON revealed that she had attended a meeting of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee in Chicago. She advised that the meeting was held at the Congress Hotel Ballroom and she was one of the principal speakers. She advised further that this meeting had been called for the purpose of raising funds for the Chicago Chapter of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee.

The Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee has been cited by the Attorney General as a Communist organization.

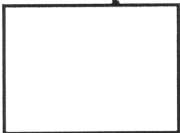

Subject's husband, William L. Patterson was also active in CP affairs in Chicago as chairman of District No. 8. In 1949, he was appointed executive secretary of the CRC, with offices in NYC. His main file is 100-39.

Information concerning Louise Patterson, wa. Louise Thompson, included in the Chicago Field Office's quarterly summary of intelligence matters, for the period April, May, and June, 1943, was briefly as follows:

On or about 5/27/43, Patterson was reported to have been in New York (purpose of trip not stated). She attended the National Negro Congress in Detroit, Michigan on 5/30/43, and on 6/12/43 left for Detroit to speak at an IWO conclave. On 6/6/43, attended CP Victory Press Conference held at Hamilton Hotel, Chicago, in connection with the CP's national drive for the "Daily Worker". During the conference she stated "The 'Daily Worker' over the years has been the champion of all national groups and of Negro rights." She was elected as a member of the Continuation Committee for the fund drive. Patterson also pledged \$2000 toward the fund drive from the IWO. On 6/4/43, she contacted [redacted] [redacted] of the CP, and discussed what was apparently a joint venture between the CP and the IWO. Also during this period, she was active in protest meetings held in Chicago, to register opposition to race riots in Detroit and to make plans to avoid such riots in Chicago.
