## EXPLANATION OF EXEMPTIONS

### SUBSECTIONS OF TITLE 5, UNITED STATES CODE, SECTION 552

- (b)(1) (A) specifically authorized under criteria established by an Executive order to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy and (B) are in fact properly classified to such Executive order;
- (b)(2) related solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of an agency;
- (b)(3) specifically exempted from disclosure by statute (other than section 552b of this title), provided that such statute(A) requires that the matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on issue, or (B) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld;
- (b)(4) trade secrets and commercial or financial information obtained from a person and privileged or confidential;
- (b)(5) inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency;
- (b)(6) personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy;
- (b)(7) records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, but only to the extent that the production of such law enforcement records or information ( A ) could be reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings, ( B ) would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication, ( C ) could be reasonably expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, ( D ) could reasonably be expected to disclose the identity of confidential source, including a State, local, or foreign agency or authority or any private institution which furnished information on a confidential basis, and, in the case of record or information compiled by a criminal law enforcement authority in the course of a criminal investigation, or by an agency conducting a lawful national security intelligence investigation, information furnished by a confidential source, ( E ) would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law, or ( F ) could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any individual;
- (b)(8) contained in or related to examination, operating, or condition reports prepared by, on behalf of, or for the use of an agency responsible for the regulation or supervision of financial institutions; or
- (b)(9) geological and geophysical information and data, including maps, concerning wells.

- (d)(5) information compiled in reasonable anticipation of a civil action proceeding;
- (j)(2) material reporting investigative efforts pertaining to the enforcement of criminal law including efforts to prevent, control, or reduce crime or apprehend criminals;
- (k)(1) information which is currently and properly classified pursuant to an Executive order in the interest of the national defense or foreign policy, for example, information involving intelligence sources or methods;
- (k)(2) investigatory material compiled for law enforcement purposes, other than criminal, which did not result in loss of a right, benefit or privilege under Federal programs, or which would identify a source who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence;
- (k)(3) material maintained in connection with providing protective services to the President of the United States or any other individual pursuant to the authority of Title 18, United States Code, Section 3056;
- (k)(4) required by statute to be maintained and used solely as statistical records;
- (k)(5) investigatory material compiled solely for the purpose of determining suitability, eligibility, or qualifications for Federal civilian employment or for access to classified information, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence;
- (k)(6) testing or examination material used to determine individual qualifications for appointment or promotion in Federal Government service the release of which would compromise the testing or examination process;
- (k)(7) material used to determine potential for promotion in the armed services, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished the material pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence.

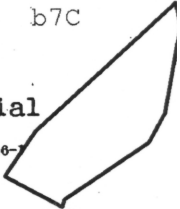

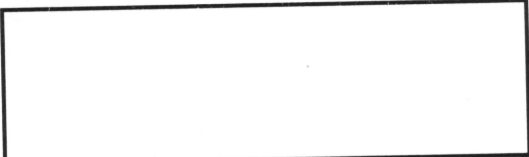

He stated he considered the applicant to be of good character, reputation, and associates. He recommended the applicant for a position of trust.

[redacted] a former instructor at Louisville Municipal College, stated that he was socially acquainted with the applicant from 1935 to 1936. He stated that at no time has he had reason to doubt the applicant's loyalty or patriotism toward the United States Government. He stated he was acquainted with the applicant's wife and considered her a loyal American.

**DETAILS:** AT ELIZABETH CITY, NORTH CAROLINA

[Redacted] State Teachers College, Elizabeth City, North Carolina, advised that although she was not a close social acquaintance of JAY SAUNDERS REDDING, she knew him as a fellow staff member while at the college from 1938 until 1943. [Redacted] stated that REDDING impressed her very favorably. It was her opinion that he was one of the outstanding personalities she had ever known. [Redacted] stated she could not recall any specific organizations that REDDING was affiliated with during the time he was at the State Teachers College, but to the best of her knowledge he belonged only to academic honoraries, such as Phi Beta Kappa.

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[Redacted] advised she has read some of the books written by JAY SAUNDERS REDDING and stated that nothing she had read

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gave any indication of anything but complete loyalty to the Federal Government and satisfaction in democracy as a political philosopher. Without equivocation, [redacted] recommended JAY SAUNDERS REDDING as a person completely loyal and patriotic and worthy of a position of trust with the government.

[redacted] State Teachers College, Elizabeth City, North Carolina, advised that JAY SAUNDERS REDDING taught at this institution for five years in the latter part of the 1930's and early part of the 1940's. [redacted] advised that he was not aware that REDDING had been affiliated with any organizations other than strictly academic during his tenure at the State Teachers College. He stated Mr. REDDING won the "Mayflower Award" several years ago for his book No Day of Triumph. This award is presented to North Carolina authors for outstanding productions in the literary field. [redacted] advised that REDDING had written several other books, among them To Make a Poet, Black and Readings for Freshman English Composition, written in collaboration with another professor [redacted]

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[redacted] stated he was not personally familiar with any of REDDING'S relatives other than a brother, LOUIS REDDING, attorney, Wilmington, Delaware, and an [redacted] last name unknown, whom he had previously met through the applicant. He stated he believed that these persons enjoyed a good reputation in their community, but that other than that he knew nothing of them.

[redacted] stated that JAY SAUNDERS REDDING spoke at the Chapel of the State Teachers College at Elizabeth City, North Carolina, Sunday, February 8, 1953, on the request of the college authorities. [redacted] advised that had REDDING been considered anything but patriotic, he would have never received such a request. He went on to say that REDDING was frequently requested to return to the State Teachers College for such addresses.

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It was [redacted] opinion that JAY SAUNDERS REDDING has a keener appreciation of democracy than most. He stated that he has specifically discussed political philosophy and democracy with Mr. REDDING and believes that democracy and America have no more staunch supporter. [redacted] related that the REDDINGS have recently returned from a trip to India which had been sponsored by the State Department, and he was of the opinion that this trip did much to focus REDDING'S appreciation of the American form of government and way of life. [redacted] strongly

recommended the applicant for a position of trust with the government.

[redacted] advised that he knew JAY SAUNDERS REDDING during the period that he taught at the State Teachers College in Elizabeth City, North Carolina. [redacted] stated he never knew the applicant to be connected with any type of organization or society that might be considered questionable. He stated that he has read parts of the book To Make A Poet Black, written by JAY SAUNDERS REDDING, but none of the other of his works. He advised that he had never been acquainted with any of Mr. REDDING'S relatives. [redacted] was of the opinion that REDDING was a completely loyal and patriotic citizen and he stated he would highly recommend him for a position of trust with the government.

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[redacted] advised that she has been a close friend and acquaintance of JAY SAUNDERS REDDING and his family both socially and professionally since 1941 when she first met him at the State Teachers College at Elizabeth City, North Carolina. [redacted] stated she had read most of Mr. REDDING'S writings and advised that though his writings often offered pointed criticism of racial inequities existing in the United States, nothing contained in these writings indicated that he considered the American form of government other than the only way of satisfactorily reconciling these difficulties.

[redacted] advised that she is not acquainted with any of REDDING'S relatives. She stated that JAY SAUNDERS REDDING was the principal speaker at the vespers service at the State Teachers College Chapel, Elizabeth City, North Carolina, on Sunday, February 8, 1953. In this speech, Mr. REDDING dwelt on Communism at some length. He strongly defended democracy and stated he had also done so on many occasions while visiting India during his recent trip under the auspices of the State Department. [redacted] feels and says that REDDING expressly states that he detests Communism. [redacted] stated that many negroes in the South tend to be bitter to the extent that they failed to look at social and political problems objectively. She considers this a weakness or human failing that Mr. REDDING has not succumbed to. She stated that REDDING has a unique ability to evaluate objectively and without prejudice. She went on to say that through this ability, he has seen the errors in the arguments put forth and directed towards the negro population in the United States of foreign ideologies. He staunchly defends this country and its form of government wherever the opportunity presents itself. He specifically stated in his Sunday speech that while in India he found the Indians citing examples of reported injustices in the United States toward members of minority groups. He stated that many times he found himself having to

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defend America, saying "that is my country." He strongly objected to the citing of rare examples and the suggesting that these rare examples constituted the rule in American life rather than the exception.

[redacted] strongly recommends REDDING as an intelligently fervent patriot and considers him preeminently qualified for a position of trust with the Federal Government.

[redacted] State Teachers College, Elizabeth City, North Carolina, advised that she was acquainted with JAY SAUNDERS REDDING during the period that he taught at the State Teachers College in Elizabeth City during the late 1930's and early 1940's. She stated that during this time she knew REDDING quite well. She stated that she was not aware of any particular organizations that REDDING might have belonged to at that time. It was her opinion that this man would not have a membership in any organization of a questionable nature. [redacted] advised she recalled REDDING had written a good many books, among them No Day of Triumph, Stranger and Alone, and On Being a Negro in America. She stated that she could derive from these books no hint of lack of loyalty and patriotism. [redacted] stated that she had never been acquainted with any of Mr. REDDING'S relatives. [redacted] advised that JAY SAUNDERS REDDING had spoken at the college chapel Sunday, February 8, 1953, about his trip to India for the State Department. She stated that during his speech he indicated that India has lost many of its good minds to Communism. He stated that frequently he was placed in the position of having to strongly defend democracy in America while in India.

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[redacted] considers REDDING a staunch defender of democracy and a loyal, patriotic American. He would highly recommend him for a position of trust with the government.

[redacted]  
[redacted] of the Colored American Legion Post in Elizabeth City, North Carolina, advised that he remembers JAY SAUNDERS REDDING quite well. He remembered that REDDING had written a good many books and articles and was considered an outstanding teacher by both students and faculty. [redacted] stated that from his acquaintance with REDDING, he had gained the impression that he was very straightforward and of good character. From discussion and speeches of REDDING [redacted] felt that REDDING was a completely loyal and patriotic citizen. He also stated that he had never heard

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anything from students, faculty members, or neighbors indicating anything but complete loyalty and integrity on the part of JAY SAUNDERS REDDING. [redacted] advised that he was a close friend of [redacted] who was considered exceedingly well informed on the conditions and personalities of the State Teachers College, Elizabeth City, North Carolina. [redacted] stated that since he felt that [redacted] would give information more freely to him than to the writer, he would be glad to discuss JAY SAUNDERS REDDING with her without divulging the reason therefor.

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[redacted] of known reliability, advised that he had under pretense discussed with [redacted] the applicant. He stated that [redacted] considers JAY SAUNDERS REDDING an outstanding person of unquestioned loyalty. Upon being questioned by [redacted] concerning the subject of REDDING'S loyalty, she was incensed at any intimation of doubt concerning the loyalty of JAY SAUNDERS REDDING and stated that if she had to choose "the faculty member of recent years that was most fervently loyal and patriotic; it would be JAY SAUNDERS REDDING." [redacted] advised that these statements were made by [redacted] in refuting statements made by [redacted] and attributed to fellow legionnaires concerning REDDING'S loyalty and political philosophy.

[redacted] Atlanta University and Morehouse College, advised that he has been acquainted with REDDING for approximately 25 years. He stated that REDDING was employed as an instructor in the English Department at Morehouse College and worked [redacted] for the three years that he was at Morehouse. [redacted] stated that at the time REDDING came to Morehouse no formal application was submitted by faculty members and that to his knowledge no personnel file was maintained by the school. [redacted] advised that in regard to the character and reputation of REDDING, he would highly recommend him without any reservations. He stated that in regard to REDDING's loyalty as an American citizen, that he considers him loyal and patriotic and a firm believer in our constitutional form of government. He advised that REDDING has written several books since leaving Morehouse College and that it might be deducted from these writings that REDDING is a protestor--meaning one who speaks freely against what he considers to be injustices against his own people. He advised that REDDING feels such matters keenly and that he is a sensitive person; however, he considers REDDING to be a loyal and patriotic American on the basis of his association with him. He advised that REDDING is in reality a snob and an aristocrat amongst the negro people and for that reason would not believe him interested in any subversive movements, Communist or otherwise. He advised that REDDING possesses a great deal of literary talent and that he considers him a literary artist expressing himself as an artist rather than voicing actual objections and he thinks REDDING is a firm believer in the due process of law under our present form of government. He stated that during the time REDDING was a member of the faculty at Morehouse College, SAMUEL H. ARCHER and Dr. JOHN HOPE were presidents of Morehouse College and that both of these individuals are deceased.

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[redacted] School of Religion, Morehouse College, advised that he had a limited acquaintanceship with JAY SAUNDERS REDDING as he was a student at Morehouse during the time REDDING was a member of the faculty. He stated that REDDING had an excellent reputation at Morehouse as being a capable leader, that he had a strong character and that his associates were primarily those other individuals on the faculty at Morehouse. He advised that he attended several of REDDING's lectures, and based on these lectures and other information he has gained concerning REDDING, he would consider him to be a loyal and patriotic American. He advised that he would recommend REDDING for a position of trust with the government.

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[redacted] Atlanta University, advised that he has known REDDING for approximately 20 years and that he worked under his supervision for two years at Louisville University as a member of the faculty. [redacted] advised that he personally contacted REDDING at Morehouse College in 1931 and offered him a position at Louisville University. He stated that the character and reputation of REDDING are above reproach. He advised that REDDING just recently returned from India where he spent approximately sixty days in connection with some program of the State Department of the United

States. He advised that the associates of REDDING to his knowledge were those of any other member of a college faculty, mainly confined to fellow instructors and professors. He advised that to his knowledge REDDING is not connected with any Communist groups or any other subversive groups and that he would consider him to be a loyal and patriotic American citizen.

[redacted] Morehouse College, advised that he was a member of the faculty at Morehouse at the time REDDING was also a member. [redacted] stated that on the basis of his association with REDDING approximately two or three years around 1928, that he knew of nothing which would reflect against his character, reputation, associates or loyalty as an American citizen. [redacted]

[redacted] stated that he has had no contact with REDDING since he left the campus of Morehouse College.

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[redacted] Morehouse College, advised that he has been acquainted with REDDING for the past 25 years. He advised that he knew him not only in connection with his work at Morehouse College, but was also socially acquainted with REDDING. He advised that to this day he contacts REDDING when passing through the community where REDDING resides. He further advised that REDDING had an excellent reputation, was of good character and that his associates were generally confined, while at Morehouse, to other faculty members. He advised that since REDDING has become quite prominent as a writer, he probably has developed numerous associates along those lines, but that he is not acquainted with any of them. He stated that he has no qualms whatsoever about recommending REDDING for a position of trust with the U. S. Government, as he considers him a loyal and patriotic American. [redacted] further advised that during the time REDDING was a member of the faculty at Morehouse College, he resided in one of the Morehouse dormitories.

[redacted] Morehouse College, advised that he has been acquainted with REDDING for approximately 25 years; however, during the past 20 years or so his contacts with REDDING have been limited. He stated that on the basis of his previous association with REDDING, he would describe him as having good character, excellent reputation, and his associates were of a similar type. He stated that he had no reason whatsoever to question the loyalty of REDDING as an American citizen.

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[redacted] Morehouse College, advised that he was acquainted with REDDING during the time he was a member of the faculty at Morehouse and has on several occasions seen him since that time. He stated that based on this limited association with REDDING, he would describe him as a man of good character, good reputation and a loyal and patriotic American. [redacted] advised that at the time he was acquainted with REDDING, he was quite young and has no definite idea as to the philosophy of life REDDING has acquired after he has reached his maturity. [redacted] stated that he would recommend REDDING for a position of trust with the United States Government.



AT 123-695

[redacted] Morehouse College, advised that he has been acquainted with REDDING for approximately 30 years as they were both in school at Brown University together, they taught at Morehouse College together and he has since that time kept in contact with REDDING. He stated that the character and reputation of REDDING were unquestionable and that he does not consider him subversive or disloyal as an American citizen. He advised that REDDING is one of the outstanding authors of his race and that he considers him highly individualistic, however has noted that as he has matured with age he has become more mellow in his thinking. He stated that at Hampton Institute where REDDING is presently a faculty member, he is very closely associated with the leaders of that school and believes that he has made a commendable record there. [redacted] advised that he would recommend REDDING for a position of trust with the United States Government.

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[redacted] Atlanta University, advised that she was formerly [redacted] Morehouse College at the time REDDING was on the faculty at Morehouse. She advised that REDDING to her knowledge was of good character, reputation and associated with a similar type of people. She stated that on the basis of her limited association with REDDING, she considered him to be a loyal and patriotic American.

[redacted] Morehouse College, advised that he has been acquainted with REDDING for approximately 25 years. He stated that since REDDING's departure from the campus, his acquaintance has only been casual; however, during the time REDDING was on the faculty at Morehouse, [redacted] advised that he had a good character, excellent reputation, and to his knowledge was a loyal and patriotic American. [redacted] advised that REDDING resided in one of the dormitories at Morehouse College when he was on the faculty. He stated that he would recommend REDDING for a position of trust with the United States Government.

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Confidential informants, of known reliability and who have furnished information concerning Communist activities in the Atlanta area, advised that JAY SAUNDERS REDDING is unknown to them.

Credit and criminal

Special Employee [redacted] checked the records of the Atlanta Police Department on REDDING and his wife, and no record could be found.

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Special Employee [redacted] checked the records of the Atlanta Credit Bureau, and no credit record could be found on either JAY SAUNDERS REDDING or his wife.

He said REDDING was having some family difficulties while he was at Southern but he felt these had been straightened out inasmuch as he has visited in the REDDING home several times since then and there is no indication of marital difficulties. He said the applicant lived in a house on their campus while he was there, and was very well respected.

[redacted] Auditor's Office, Southern University, advised she knew the applicant well while he was at the university. She remembered he had a good reputation, was of good character, and regarded as a loyal citizen. She could furnish only favorable information concerning him.

[redacted] Administrative Offices, Southern University, advised she, too, recalled the applicant well, and she furnished virtually the same information concerning him as did [redacted]

[redacted] Southern University, advised he recalled the applicant well and, in fact, lived a short distance from him while he resided on the campus. He said the applicant was regarded as a loyal citizen and he did not believe he was connected with any subversive organization. He stated the applicant was having some marital difficulties while he was there, but he had since learned these had been cleared. He said he had a good reputation on the campus and was considered to be of good character.

[redacted] Southern University, informed he knew the applicant well and that he lived near him on the campus while he was on the campus. He said REDDING had a good reputation, was of good character and was generally well regarded. Personnel records located at the Office of the Dean of Faculty, Hampton Institute, reflected that applicant has been employed as a professor of literature and composition since September 1, 1943.

Birth data verified according to records.

Records further reflected that applicant was on leave in 1949 for one semester at which time he went on a lecture tour for the American Friends Committee, and on another occasion in 1952, for a month and a half at which time he visited India on behalf of the United States State Department. There was nothing noted in the records of a derogatory or unpatriotic nature.

[redacted] Hampton Institute, advised he has known the applicant professionally and socially for 9 years. He stated that he felt he knows the applicant quite well and has had no reason during the course of his association with applicant, to question the loyalty of the applicant or his family to the U. S. Government, nor would he have any reason to question reputation or known associates. He stated he has met the applicant's father and his brother, LOUIS, who is an attorney in Wilmington, Delaware, as well as one of his sisters and he has had no reason to question any of them. As to the applicant's brother LOUIS, [redacted] said he was associated with him for about six weeks when they were both on a segregation case in the schools at Wilmington, Delaware. He said that the brother has an excellent reputation in his community and he knew of no reason to doubt his patriotism.

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[redacted] further advised that he is acquainted with the applicant's writings and feels that they are not meant to set forth any pro-Communist ideas, but are directed toward the improvement of the Negro's position in present day society. He said that the applicant has been very critical in his writings as to the status of the Negro, but is endeavoring, through the writings, to give a better understanding of the Negro's plight. [redacted] stated he felt the criticism set forth by the applicant is meant to be of a constructive sort and has no subversive purpose whatsoever behind it.

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[redacted] said that he knew of no subversive organizations to which the applicant held membership and would recommend him for a position of trust with the Government. He stated that assuming the applicant is to prepare material for either writing or lecturing for the Government, he would be



an excellent choice to answer any propaganda charges and would have an excellent understanding as to what material would be relevant. He stated that he was certain Professor REDDING did not hold to any other economic system than the American system of economy which [redacted] personally felt was an indication that the applicant had no subversive leanings.

[redacted] Hampton Institute, stated he has been acquainted with applicant professionally as well as socially since 1929, and had no doubt as to the applicant being a loyal U. S. citizen as well as no question as to his reputation or known associates. He advised that he met the applicant's father and brother, LOUIS, and had no reason to question either of them. As to the applicant's brother, [redacted] said that he was aware of the fact that he was prominent in segregation cases which were being conducted in Delaware. The brother, he felt, is attempting to aid the Negro's plight through his contributions in the legal field. He stated that the brother is <sup>an</sup> National Association for the Advancement of Colored People Attorney and is not aware of any affiliation of the brother with organizations which are in any way subversive.

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[redacted] said that the applicant is very critical in his writings which deal primarily with the status of the Negro in America. He did not feel that they were in any way anti-American, but felt the applicant had as his objective the improvement of the status of the Negro. He stated that the applicant is a person who is very emotional and high-strung and these traits come out in his writings, which deal with the disadvantages and handicaps of being a Negro. He said that applicant is subjective as an individual and his writings hold to his subjective opinion.

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[redacted] said that he would recommend the applicant for a position of trust with the Government, but would recommend that if it were a position in which he was to do any writing, that his material should be carefully reviewed before being presented publicly. [redacted] said it is quite possible that people subjected to his writing might take it in a very different light than the author may be attempting to impart. He suggested that the applicant's latest publication, "On Being A Negro In America" would give the reviewing authorities a good idea as to what he, [redacted] means. The applicant, in his works, expresses his individual opinions and these may not be concurred with by the Government.

NF 123-394

[redacted] Hampton Institute, advised he has known the applicant professionally as well as socially since 1943, and highly recommended the applicant as to patriotism, morals, character, and known associates. He further advised that he is not well acquainted with any other than the applicant's immediate family located at Hampton, but from what he knows of the other members of the family, he would have no reason to question any of them.

He stated that the applicant is not interested in any sort of organizations and is what might be classified as a "non-joiner". He advised that he is acquainted with applicant's writings and believes that the latest book of the applicant, "On Being A Negro In America" is a hard blow to Communism. He stated that applicant is a subjective and emotional writer and that his works could definitely be termed as not being subversive.

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[redacted] Hampton Institute, advised he has known the applicant professionally and socially for six years and recommended both the applicant and his family as to patriotism, morals, character, and associates. He stated that the applicant is a very creative writer, sociologically and psychologically. He believed that the applicant thought on the basis of his convictions which are not of a subversive nature, but are pointed more at bringing a better adjustment as to the use and problems of the Negroes. He advised that it is his belief that the applicant is opposed to any philosophy such as those of the Communists. He stated that applicant is a person who could assume a position of trust.

Confidential Informant T-1, of unknown reliability, advised that she has known the applicant professionally since 1943, and would hesitate to recommend him for any position with the Government as his writings give reason to believe that he has a bitterness about the plight of the Negroes. T-1 felt that the applicant should not be used to do any work which involves either lecturing or writing as he injects this bitterness in his work, although it is probably his purpose to forward the progress of the Negroes. T-1 said his work might well be used to incite race hatred of the white race.

T-1 stated that she has actually no reason to question the loyalty of the applicant to the United States, although she has often considered as to whether or not the applicant is a Communist. T-1 did not wish to make any written statement nor did she wish to appear before a hearing board.

[redacted] and [redacted] all of Hampton Institute, stated they have known the applicant professionally since 1943 and have no reason to doubt the applicant's loyalty to the United States, nor have they any reason to question his reputation or associates.

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There was no record of the applicant or his family in the files of the Hampton Jail, and the only record of the applicant at the Hampton Police Department was that of one minor traffic violation in 1950.

The applicant has a satisfactory credit rating according to the files of the Hampton Retail Merchants Association.

T-2, of known reliability, who is familiar with certain phases of the Communist Party activity in the Norfolk area, advised that he is not acquainted with nor has he heard leaders of the local Communist Party ever mention JAY SAUNDERS REDDING.

[redacted] all of Wilmington, Delaware, advised SA [redacted] that they have known the applicant and his family for forty-five, forty-four and thirty-five years, respectively, as neighbors. They added that the applicant is an honest, reliable, trustworthy and reliable man of exemplary character and reputation within the neighborhood. They further advised that they have no reason to doubt the applicant's loyalty to the United States or his ability to have access to confidential or restricted information. They stated that the applicant's associates include only people of the highest calibre and that they would recommend the applicant for a position of trust. All stated that the applicant's family has maintained a fine reputation in the neighborhood and are highly respected by all the neighbors.

MISCELLANEOUS

In a prior investigation in March, 1944, [redacted] who presently resides at [redacted] advised SA [redacted] that approximately two years ago he, [redacted] was a member of the Communist Party in Wilmington, Delaware, and at the same time, LOUIS LORENZO REDDING (who is identical with applicant's brother) was also a member of the Communist Party of Wilmington, Delaware. He stated that he and LOUIS L. REDDING had been present together at meetings of the Communist Party held on the second floor of the building located at Sixth and Tatnall Streets in Wilmington. He also advised that during that same period, LOUIS REDDING was also legal adviser of the Party.

The Communist Party has been designated by the Attorney General as coming within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

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In the latter part of 1951, [redacted] was recontacted and reaffirmed his identification of LOUIS LORENZO REDDING as a person with whom he had attended Communist Party meetings in Wilmington, Delaware in the 1920's. He said upon recontact that he believes that REDDING was an attorney at the time he was attending Communist Party meetings but he admitted that it was possible that LOUIS REDDING was in attendance at these meetings prior to the time he was graduated from Harvard Law School, but he also stated that to his own knowledge LOUIS REDDING was the Legal Adviser of the Communist Party at that time.

Baltimore Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, who has knowledge of some phases of Communist Party activity in the Wilmington, Delaware area, advised in the latter part of 1951, that he had no definite knowledge that LOUIS LORENZO REDDING had been an actual member of the Communist Party and he knew of no specific activity on the part of REDDING that would indicate that he was a member of the Communist Party.

T-1 recalled that LOUIS L. REDDING had some contact with a member of the East Side Branch of the Communist Party in Wilmington, Delaware, but he did not recall the nature of this connection or the source from which he learned of this connection. T-1 recalled that LOUIS REDDING has in the past contributed financially to the Party, but he could recall no specific instances when he made these contributions.

Baltimore Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, who has knowledge of some phases of Communist Party activity in the Wilmington, Delaware area, advised in November, 1951 that he has no information that LOUIS LORENZO REDDING is a member of the Communist Party.

Baltimore Confidential Informant T-3, a prominent member of the State Bar Association in Wilmington, Delaware, advised in November, 1951 that he had heard fellow lawyers in Wilmington, whose names he could not recall, describe LOUIS LORENZO REDDING as a person believed to have Communist sympathies because of his activity against racial discrimination. However, T-3 said he knows nothing definite that would indicate that LOUIS REDDING is a Communist and he does not recall that anyone specifically gave him any proof that LOUIS REDDING is a Communist.

Baltimore Confidential Informant T-4, a prominent member of the State Bar Association, Wilmington, Delaware, advised in November, 1951 that he has never received any information to the effect that LOUIS LORENZO REDDING is a Communist or member of the Communist Party.

Baltimore Confidential Informant T-2 advised in November, 1951 that LOUIS REDDING handles all labor work for the Delaware Fellowship Commission.

It is noted that on January 2, 1951 T-2 advised that the Delaware Fellowship Commission was an organization formed shortly prior thereto for the purpose of eliminating discrimination. He
