In previous investigation conducted in 1951, a review of the files of the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) reflected that the Daily Worker issue of May 27, 1941 on page 1 contained an article datelined Washington, D.C. "160 Negro Leaders Condemn Drive to War and Destruction of our Peoples' Rights" and on page 5 had an article headlined "160 Negro Leaders Blast War, General Chaos and Defense". The name LOUIS LORENZO REDDING, Wilmington, Delaware was included on the list of signers of the article.

The Daily Worker is an East Coast Communist newspaper.

The HCUA files also reflected that LOUIS REDDING, Wilmington, Delaware, according to information obtained from the New York Office of the Special Committee on Un-American Activities endorsed the Lifting of the Loyalists Spanish Embargo. No further information was reflected regarding this entry.

The Co-ordinating Committee to Lift the (Spanish) Embargo was cited as one of a number of front organizations set up during the Spanish Civil War by the Communist Party in the United States and through which the Party carried on a great deal of agitation in the Special Committee on Un-American Activities Report March 29, 1944, pages 137 and 138.

The same Committee was cited as a Communist front by the California Committee on Un-American Activities Report 1947, page 210.

HCUA files also contained a pamphlet entitled "National Negro Congress, 1936" which listed the name LOUIS L. REDDING, Delaware as a member of the Presiding Committee, member of the General Resolution Committee, and a member of the National Executive Council of this Congress in 1936.

The National Negro Congress was declared by the Attorney General to be an organization within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

Baltimore Confidential Informants T-1 and T-2 advised during the current investigation that they do not know the applicant and can furnish no information concerning his associates. These informants advised that they do not know of any association between the applicant and his brother, LOUIS LORENZO REDDING.

Baltimore Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, who has known the applicant's family since 1937 and who has known the applicant for the past eight years through their mutual association on the Afro-American Newspaper, advised that he has never had reason to question the applicant's loyalty to the United States, his character reputation or conduct. T-7 has never known him to be a member of any questionable organizations or to have any associates of doubtful loyalty. He further advised that the applicant has been an infrequent visitor to Wilmington during the past eight years and as such no close relationship exists between him and other members of his family.

CREDIT AND CRIMINAL

[redacted] Credit Bureau of Wilmington, Inc. made available to SE [redacted] credit files which reflect that applicant's father maintains a satisfactory credit rating. [redacted] advised SE [redacted] that she could locate no credit record for the applicant or other members of his immediate family.

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[redacted] Records Section, Delaware State Police Headquarters, advised SE [redacted] that she could locate no record for the applicant or other members of his immediate family.

[Redacted] further advised that REDDING continued studying for his Ph D degree but that he withdrew voluntarily in June 1933. Ph D degree was not awarded. [Redacted] stated that the record of REDDING was excellent and that no unfavorable information was contained in the file of REDDING. [Redacted] further stated that she was not personally acquainted with REDDING but that to the best of her knowledge REDDING enjoyed an excellent reputation around the university.

contained in the files of REDDING and he is eligible for rehiring, [redacted] advised. Residence of REDDING while he instructed at Brown University was given as 35 Rhode Island Ave., Providence, Rhode Island.

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[redacted] stated that she had met REDDING socially on several occasions. She further stated that she was not qualified to comment on the loyalty, character, and morals of REDDING but that to the best of her knowledge the reputation and associates of REDDING are excellent. She was aware of no reason why REDDING should not be placed in a position of trust and confidence.

REFERENCE

[redacted] Brown University, Providence, Rhode Island, advised that he was slightly acquainted with REDDING when he, REDDING, was an undergraduate and a graduate student in the late 1920's and early 1930's respectively. He further stated that he was associated with REDDING while REDDING was a visiting professor during the first semester of the 1949 to 1950 academic year. While he has been acquainted with REDDING since 1924, [redacted] advised that the acquaintance has been on a casual basis during that time. [redacted] did advise that he knows of no unfavorable information regarding REDDING. REDDING always associated with respectable persons to the best of his knowledge, [redacted] advised. [redacted] advised that he was not acquainted with the family of REDDING and could not offer any comment regarding that point. [redacted] further stated that he has no reason to suspect the loyalty of REDDING in any way. [redacted] advised that he would recommend REDDING for a position of trust and confidence.

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ASSOCIATES

[redacted] advised that he was acquainted with REDDING as a co-worker and as a neighbor since September, 1949. He further advised that he was a social acquaintance and a close friend of REDDING. REDDING resided as [redacted] house when he was a visiting professor at Brown University during the 1949 to 1950 school year. On that basis of that association [redacted] described REDDING as a person of excellent morals, reputation, associates and loyalty. [redacted] further stated that REDDING is a person who would never use his position to conduct himself in such a way so as to be detrimental to the country or the government of the United States. He further described REDDING as a scrupulous and conscientious person. [redacted] advised that he was

acquainted with the wife and children of REDDING but that he was not acquainted with any other member of the family. He stated that he only met the wife and family of REDDING on several occasions for a short time and due to the short duration of association he declined to comment regarding the loyalty and associates of the family. [redacted] did state that he knew of no reason why the character and morals of the family should not be described as anything else but excellent.

[redacted] stated that during REDDING's stay at his home, he and REDDING engaged quite often in conversations and that at no time did REDDING make any remark that would lead [redacted] to regard REDDING as anything else but loyal to the United States and their form of government. [redacted] highly recommended REDDING for a position of trust and confidence.

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[redacted] advised that he was acquainted with REDDING slightly when he, REDDING, was an undergraduate and again when REDDING returned for his Masters degree. [redacted] further stated that he has visited REDDING at Hampton, Virginia on several occasions and that they have kept in close contact for the last fifteen years through correspondence and social visits.

[redacted] stated that he and REDDING have become fairly close over the years due to the fact that their interest in the educational field was in the same category, namely English and writing.

[redacted] stated that REDDING has never said or done anything that would cause him to question the loyalty of REDDING in any way.

[redacted] further described the reputation, character, and associates of REDDING as above reproach. [redacted] stated that he was not acquainted with any member of the family of REDDING except his wife and son of whom he spoke favorably regarding the loyalty, character, and associates.

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[redacted] Brown University, Providence, Rhode Island, stated that he has been acquainted with REDDING since 1924 as a casual acquaintance for awhile as an undergraduate and for awhile as an Associate Professor. On the basis of that association he spoke favorably regarding the loyalty, character, and associates of REDDING and his family. [redacted] remarked that in the years that he has known REDDING, he has not heard of a remark, either directly or indirectly, that would cause him to question the loyalty of REDDING in any way. [redacted] advised

that any information that he has come in possession of has been favorable. [redacted] recommended REDDING for a position of trust and confidence.

[redacted] Brown University, advised that he was only acquainted with REDDING during the semester that REDDING was a visiting professor. He was acquainted with REDDING as a co-worker and a slight social acquaintance during that length of time. On the basis of that association [redacted] described REDDING as a loyal American with excellent character and associates. [redacted] recommended REDDING for a position of trust and confidence.

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[redacted] Library, Brown University, advised that LINDSEY TODD DAMON is now deceased. [redacted] Main Office, Brown University, advised that Dean R.G.D. RICHARDSON is now deceased. Both DAMON and RICHARDSON were listed by REDDING in the records of the University of Louisville, Louisville, Kentucky as references.

Reliable Boston informants who are familiar with certain phases of Communist Party activity in Rhode Island, advised that the applicant is unknown to them and they possess no information concerning him.

The Southern Patriot, official organ of the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Inc., in its issue of March, 1950, Volume 8, Number 3, page 1, announced that the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Inc., at New Orleans, Louisiana, was serving as co-ordinator for a Southwide Convention on Discrimination in Higher Education which would be held in Atlanta University, Atlanta, Georgia, on April 8, 1950. It was to be held under the sponsorship of a group of 200 professors and administrators from more than 100 colleges and universities in sixteen Southern states and the District of Columbia.

[redacted] of Florida Southern College, was announced as conference [redacted] Attention at the conference was to be focused upon greater concern for the elimination of the discrimination in higher education. [redacted] speaking in the Southern Patriot stated that although changes were taking place in the South; nevertheless "in no Southern community can it be said that in the treatment of racial minorities there is anything even remotely approximating the basic American concepts of democracy and equality of educational opportunity."

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[redacted] of the Sociology Department, Howard University, Washington, D. C., was announced as keynote speaker. There were to be two sessions of panel discussions with the following themes:

- Morning session - "The Present Situation And Recent Gains"
- Afternoon session - "The Regional School Plan" and "Methods And Techniques in Eliminating Discrimination."

The Southern Patriot extended an invitation to all administrative officials and teachers and students of Southern institutions of higher learning to attend, as well as officials of State Departments of Education, labor leaders, ministers, and other professional men with a special interest in education. In the same issue of the Southern Patriot, on pages two and three, a partial list of sponsors was announced. The Patriot carefully pointed out that the institutions and organizations appearing behind the names of the sponsors were for identification purposes only. This list of sponsors included the name J. SAUNDERS REDDING, Professor of English, Hampton, Virginia.

Confidential Informants New Orleans T-1, T-2 and T-3, of known reliability, and who are acquainted with the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Inc., and its parent organization, the Southern Conference for Human Welfare, have advised that the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Inc., was originally an adjunct of the Southern Conference for Human Welfare before the latter's demise in 1948. Political differences among the Southern Conference for Human Welfare leaders and unfavorable publicity from the House Committee on un-American Activities resulted in its dissolution and, although the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Inc., continued as a separate and independent organization, it stressed the fact it was non-political in nature. The Fund has devoted its efforts primarily to race relations, particularly in the field of education, campaigning against discrimination and segregation in this field of endeavor.

The above informants have advised that the principal leaders of the Southern Conference for Human Welfare are the same as those who presently head the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Inc. [redacted] has served [redacted] of both the Southern Conference for Human Welfare and the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Inc. While the Communist Party was interested in infiltrating and controlling the Southern Conference for Human Welfare, it has given little indication of interest in the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Inc.

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The Southern Conference for Human Welfare, the parent organization, has been cited by the House Committee on un-American Activities as a Communist front. Confidential Informant New Orleans T-1 stated that the Southern Conference for Human Welfare during its active period was considered by the Communist Party as a transmission belt to reach the masses. However, not all of the national officers of the Southern Conference for Human Welfare were controlled by the Communist Party.

Confidential Informants New Orleans T-4, T-5, and T-6, of known reliability, who were active in the Southern Conference for Human Welfare, advised that JAMES ANDERSON DOMBROWSKI, the Director of the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Inc., worked closely in the past with Communist Party members and invariably followed their advice along Communist Party lines. T-4 stated, however, that DOMBROWSKI liked to show some independence in regard to minor details. T-5 advised that DOMBROWSKI argued that his decisions siding with the Communist Party clique were the result of independent thinking and that he himself was a Christian Socialist.

Confidential Informant New Orleans T-7, of known reliability, and a long-time member of the Communist Party, advised that he did not believe DOMBROWSKI to be a member of the Communist Party but knew him as being sympathetic with the Party over a period of years. DOMBROWSKI took orders from the Communist Party and was an officer in the Southern Conference for Human Welfare through the determined efforts of the Communist Party. However, DOMBROWSKI on one occasion requested a Communist Party member to resign from the old Southern Conference for Human Welfare when it became publicly known that this individual was a Communist since DOMBROWSKI feared that this disclosure might jeopardize the organization.

These records reflect the applicant was listed by Howard High School, Wilmington, Del., as JAMES SAUNDERS REDDING, and in personal correspondence between the University and the applicant he has signed his name as J. SAUNDERS REDDING. His date of birth was listed as October 13, 1905. The applicant was never subject to disciplinary action during his attendance at this school.

In March 1952 Philadelphia Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, who will not furnish a signed statement or appear before a hearing board, advised he had observed a printed flyer announcing a "Peoples Unity Rally" to be held March 20, 1952, at the Academy of Music Foyer by the Pennsylvania Civil Rights Congress, 1831 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, Pa. Admission, according to this flyer, was the purchase of a copy of "We Charge Genocide" by WILLIAM L. PATTERSON, National Executive Secretary of the Civil Rights Congress. This flyer listed the favorable comment of prominent individuals concerning this publication, and included among these individuals was J. SAUNDERS REDDING.

The Civil Rights Congress was designated by the Attorney General as within the purview of Executive Order 9835 on November 24, 1947, and September 21, 1948.

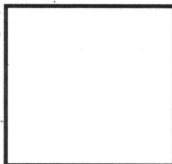

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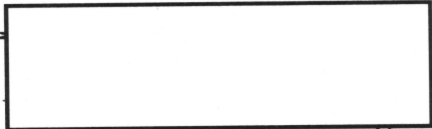

As found in report of SA [redacted] dated March 18, 1944 at Cleveland, Ohio, captioned "UNIVERSAL NEGRO IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION AND AFRICAN COMMUNITIES' LEAGUE, Aka - [redacted] et al - INTERNAL SECURITY - J", Confidential Informant Cleveland T-1, who was [redacted] advised that at a meeting of captioned organization on January 16, 1944, one [redacted] read an article from the "Negro Digest" written by one J. SAUNDERS REDDING.

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[redacted] stated further that [redacted] remarked at the time that "the writer, J. SAUNDERS REDDING, must have been in the GARVEY movement as he talks like we've been telling negroes to talk all these years. He writes an article like this and gets away with it. He must know somebody".

Former [redacted] who also attended the aforementioned meeting, advised that [redacted] referred to the January, 1944 edition of the "Negro Digest" and read J. SAUNDERS REDDING's article "What the Negro Believes". A copy of this article was retained in the Cleveland file but was subsequently destroyed.

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It is set forth in the report of SA [redacted] that this article reflects: "the average Negro in America does not believe that the death of a black man in a war for the Four Freedoms will be enough to win for himself an extension of Democratic rights. He does not believe in the righteousness of the Allied cause. He does not believe that the white men who are conducting this war for America, in America's name, mean what they say. He doesn't believe that the negro will get any consideration for having died in combat as a soldier in this war. He believes that he is going to be permitted to fight the Japanese because killing Japanese, who, after all are not white men, and who, so we have been told time and time again, are not the main enemy, is different from killing the white men of Germany and can give the Negro no feeling of after-all-Negroes-can-kill-white-men-and-get-away-with-it. The average Negro in America believes that the average white man has nothing but hatred in his heart for the Negro".

[redacted] advised that he has been acquainted with JAY SAUNDERS REDDING for over thirty years and first knew him as a fellow classmate at Lincoln University, Pennsylvania; that JAY SAUNDERS REDDING, who was from Wilmington, Delaware, attended there about one year and then transferred to Brown University in Rhode Island. Since that time [redacted] has maintained a social acquaintance with REDDING, who is married and has two sons, [redacted]

[redacted] advised that when REDDING visits in New York, he and REDDING and their wives usually attend social functions. As a result, he has been aware of REDDING's success as a novelist. [redacted] who was also acquainted with JAY SAUNDERS REDDING's brother, LOUIS L. REDDING, an attorney, advised that LOUIS frequently visits New York in connection with legal matters but maintains law offices at Wilmington, Delaware. [redacted] knew nothing derogatory concerning JAY SAUNDERS

REDDING and his brother and considers them loyal Americans of good character, reputation, and associates. [redacted] cited JAY SAUNDERS REDDING's recent trip to India to combat Communism as an indication of his loyalty to the United States. [redacted] recommended REDDING for a Government position of trust.

[redacted] published a book written by JAY SAUNDERS REDDING entitled, "Being a Negro in the United States" and is interested in publishing additional writings of JAY SAUNDERS REDDING. [redacted] described this work as an objective approach to the problems of the average Negro in the United States and a very excellent literary accomplishment. [redacted] believes that REDDING has a great future as a writer and knew nothing derogatory concerning REDDING's loyalty, character, reputation, and associates. [redacted] first became acquainted with REDDING about 1940 when REDDING won an award given by the state of North Carolina for outstanding literary work. Since that time, [redacted] has had only limited contact with JAY SAUNDERS REDDING, mostly as fellow members of the Editorial Board of "The American Scholar", a Phi Beta Kappa publication. [redacted] was not acquainted with other members of JAY SAUNDERS REDDING's family and recommended REDDING for a Government position of trust.

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[redacted] advised that she first became acquainted with JAY SAUNDERS REDDING about five years ago when [redacted]. Since she and REDDING became associated, he has published three books dealing with the complex living problems of the Negro in the United States. [redacted] described REDDING's writings as conservative, objective, and a very fair, unbiased approach to segregation and discrimination in this country. She recalled that REDDING traveled to India at the request of the Government in order to convince the people there that there was great opportunity for the Negro people in the United States. [redacted] considered REDDING a loyal American of good character, reputation, and associates and recommended him for a Government position of trust.

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[redacted] advised that records there reflected that on April 1, 1944, REDDING was granted a one-year fellowship to write a novel on Negro life to show "middle-class Negroes' position in the modern complex world"; that as a result of this grant, REDDING produced, "They Came in Chains", which [redacted] considered to be a fair, unbiased approach to the Negro problem in this country.

[] who only slightly recalled REDDING, advised that he knew him by reputation as a member of the Editorial Board of "The American Scholar," a Phi Beta Kappa publication, and understood he did some work in India under the auspices of the United States Government. According to Confidential Informant T-3, on March 8, 1951, the Board of Directors for the China Welfare Appeal issued a statement expressing their intention to continue to ship relief and welfare supplies to Madame SUN YAT-SEN, Vice President of the Peoples Republic of China.

Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, advised that he knew [redacted] to be a member of the Communist Party in 1945.

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In March of 1949, Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, supplied a program for the Cultural and Scientific Conference for World Peace held at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel, New York City, March 25 to 27, 1949, under the auspices of the National Council of Arts, Sciences and Professions. [redacted] was listed thereon as a sponsor. [redacted] was not further identified.

The "Daily Worker" issue, February 21, 1949, reflected that [redacted] was a sponsor of the Cultural and Scientific Conference for World Peace.

Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, advised that the above organization is part of a world-wide Communist inspired propaganda campaign.

The California Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 1949, page 476, described the above conference as an international Communist front activity growing out of a Communist sponsored congress of intellectuals held in Poland in 1948.

In March of 1950 and February of 1951, Confidential Informant T-6, of unknown reliability, provided copies of letterheads of the Physicians Forum in which it was shown that [redacted] was [redacted] of the Physicians Forum, 510 Madison Avenue, New York, New York, during 1949 and 1951.

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The "Daily Worker", issued October 23, 1945, May 26, 1948, and February 1, 1949, reflected that [redacted] was [redacted] of the

BENJAMIN J. DAVIS, JR., was one of the Communist Party leaders convicted in 1949 in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York for violation of the Smith Act.

In August, 1946, Confidential Informant T-8, of known reliability, advised that [redacted] was a member of the American Committee to Win the Peace. [redacted] was not further described.

In the "Daily Worker" issue of October 30, 1946, [redacted] was listed as [redacted] of the New York Committee to Win the Peace and as [redacted]

According to Confidential Informant T-8, the American Committee to Win the Peace and the New York Committee to Win the Peace are identical with the National Committee to Win the Peace, which latter organization has been declared by the Attorney General to be within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

A number of Confidential Informants, of known reliability, who are acquainted with some Communists and Communist activity in the New York City area, advised that they do not know JAY SAUNDERS REDDING or his brother, LOUIS L. REDDING.

A check of the records of the Bureau of Special Services and Investigation of the New York City Police Department was made by SA [redacted] and there was no record for JAY SAUNDERS REDDING or LOUIS L. REDDING.

A check of the records of the Credit Bureau of Greater New York was made by SE [redacted] and no record was located for JAY SAUNDERS REDDING. However, a record for LOUIS L. REDDING, attorney, with offices at 921 Market Street, Wilmington, Delaware, reflected that in December, 1944, he was residing at 136 Lincoln Street, Montclair, New Jersey, with his [redacted] and formerly resided at 180 West 135th Street, New York, New York; that he, LOUIS L. 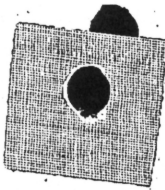
